Highlight of the Month




16 Years of Conservation:Westgate Community Conservancy

Hunted for their meat and threatened by habitat fragmentation, land degradation and unpredictable climate change, the population of the long necked Reticulated Giraffes had drastically fallen in Westgate Community Conservancy. Even with their exceptional height, no one could spot them.

Today, 16 years later, the area has over 70 giraffes, abundant elephants, impala, waterbuck, leopard, eland, buffalo, gerenuk, oryx and even resident lions.

Historically, Westgate had abundant wildlife, however, over the past few decades the wild-life numbers have declined due to rangeland degradation, expansion of settlements and poaching; however it has remained a stronghold for the critically endangered Grevy's zebra.


TNC is one of our key partners in conservation, supporting both NRT and our member conservancies operations and programs.

NRT's Communications Kicks Off Social Media Campaign to Quell Misinformation

In October, NRT Communications in consultation with the Senior Management Team (SMT) initiated a set of TRUE and FALSE question and answer posters to share over the course of the month to help the public understand and differentiate between allegations and the truth about the Northern Rangelands Trust (NRT).



Neither NRT nor its controlling community conservancies have the authority or right to move people or settlements anywhere or deny any community access to natural resources. In northern Kenya, wildlife, people and livestock continue to be normadic accross the landscape as they have for centuries. Community conservancies will never put up fences to stop normadism, except for three cases where the community themselves have set aside a small amount of land, and fenced it, for the protection of an endangered species the Black Rhinion is Fax, the Rothschild Clariffe in Ruko, and the Hirola in Ishaqbini). This was done at their own discretion in consultation with their respective County Coverments and in compliance with all statutory requirements including KWS and NEMA.

NRTs primary objective is to uphold the rights of communities, protect their properties and their livelihoods, and conserve their wildlife. Wildlife attracts to tourism and is an additional source of income for communities through livelihoods, and conservancies, Alongside herding and other agriculture, communities benefit from the tourism brought by balanced wildlife conservation. The benefits include peace, employment, local businesses, and also health, water, and education busraies. This increases community resilience in drought and reduces dependency on one source of income. A healthy environment leads to more tourism, and thus more income to the community. Communities do not have to choose between herding and tourism. They can balance the two.

NRT Meets ATI County Coordinators to Discuss Kenya RangER Programme

NRT representatives met AMAYA Triangle Initiative (ATI) County coordinators to discuss ways on how to better coordinate and support the four counties of Samburu, Laikipia, Isiolo and Baringo to fast-track implementation of the European Union (EU) funded Kenya RangER program. The teams also reviewed the program launch, implementation, challenges, and way forward. Kenya RangER program seeks to eradicate poverty, promote wildlife conservation, enhance livelihoods and promote peace and security within the AMAYA counties.





First Baby Giraffe Born in Ruko Sanctuary

On the 4th of August 2021, a Rothschilds Giraffe named Awala gave birth to her second calf in the the new Ruko Giraffe Sanctuary, Ruko Community Conservancy. The calf, a female, has not been named yet by Ruko rangers.

The baby giraffe is the first calf born in the sanctuary since the successful translocation of nine giraffes from a disappearing island which was conducted with support from the community in Ruko Conservancy, Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS), NRT, and Save Giraffe Now, among other partners. The new birth brings to 10, the total population of Ruko giraffes in the mainland.

NRT Meets Security Teams from 5 Counties

On October 5, NRT's Peace and Security teams met top security officers from Marsabit, Isiolo, Samburu, Laikipia and Meru counties led by Eastern Regional Commissioner (RC) Isaiah Nakoru to discuss partnership, stronger collaboration, and peace interventions for the Eastern region.

The Regional Commissioner who appreciated NRT's and our member conservancies' efforts on peace initiatives, emphasized the importance of partnership and engaging local communities in peace building.

As NRT and our member conservancies, we compliment national government efforts on peace building.







Rangers Engaged on Pangolin Awareness

18 mobile team rangers were engaged on pangolin conservation by the pangolin project team. This follows a number of endangered pangolins sighting in Pellow and Masol Conservancies, West Pokot which has since inspired a fresh conservation action by the community. This training seeks to identify protocols for different scenarios that rangers may encounter concerning pangolin during their daily work.



Business and Vocational Skills Mapping

In October, NRT Trading's economic empowerment team carried out business opportunity and vocational skills mapping under the USAID supported Local Works program in Biliqo Bulesa, Masol, Ruko, Meibae, Ltungai and Shurr community conservancy to identify viable entrepreneurial opportunities for the community. The team also conduct capacity assessment for star entrepreneurs to identify existing gaps and come up with a training module to build the community's capacity in entrepreneurship.

About 240 participants including local administrative officials, conservancy board members, women and youth leaders

were engaged in mapping exercises while 60 members from each of the six conservancies took part in entrepreneurs' capacity assessment.

Ten conservancies are targeted to benefit from the USAID local works program.

Maasai Mara Governance Visit

NRT regional directors toured Maasai Mara Wildlife Conservancies Association (MMWCA) this month for an exchange visit to learn about their governance model of the Mara conservancies, fundraising, sustainability strategy, community land management and ownership, wildlife and research programs, tourism, gender mainstreaming among other programmes. With lessons learnt, NRT governance hopes to strengthen governance within NRT member conservancies.

Samburu North Conservancies 2021 Activities Review

Representatives of NRT led by CEO Tom Lalampaa, Samburu County Government officials among them CEC Tourism Peter Leshakwet and Samburu County Conservancies Fund (SCCF) Board Chairperson Daniel Letoiye met to review 2021 activities including governance, peace building and security, the region's tourism agenda and solar power opportunities.

The five Samburu North conservancies (Baragoi, Ndoto, Nyiro, Ltungai-Malaso & Kirisia-Nkoteiya) were formed by the county government through SCCF Act of 2019. Strong areas of strategic partnership

and mutual engagement were mapped out especially on operations, ranger support and security as well as peace building in the conflict prone region.

About Ujuzi Manyattani

In 2019, NRT Trading in collaboration with the National Government (Ministry of Education, under TVET) and our partners launched the Ujuzi Manyattani program, an innovative initiative that takes vocational courses to remote manyattas within our member conservancies. This village-based vocational training targets youth and women, some of whom have never received any formal education by partnering with polytechnic institutions.

NRT Trading intends to train **5,000**

women and youth in income-generating

vocational skills through the Ujuzi

Manyattani program in the next 5 years

The program seeks to equip beneficiaries with alternative opportunities and economic empowerment skills to diversify their livelihoods, mitigate continued poverty and conflict cycles.

Vocational skills offered include masonry, carpentry, motorcycle mechanics, mobile phone mechanics, welding, plumbing, electrical engineering, solar installation and maintenance, hair dressing, tailoring, and catering. These are skills required by our communities especially with the growing infrastructure investments in northern Kenya.

In July 2021, at least 150 youth graduated after achieving key economic empowerment skills. So far, 210 beneficiaries from our member conservancies have graduated, started their businesses, or employed, and are now earning income from vocational training. NRT Trading intends to train 5,000 women and youth in income-generating vocational skills through the Ujuzi Manyattani program in the next five years.
